We had an excellent beginning - we had a general meeting on Aug 8th at the home of Mukulda (Mukul Chowdhary) where we made concrete plans for several actions, e.g., we're going to have quarterly meetings - dates set and venues selected till Aug '05 (you'll receive more info on this and other matters soon); and publish the ASA newsletter in paper every month - all set for one year. One of my efforts would be to increase the paid membership which at present is much less than the number of potential members.

Additionally, I'd also like to know what our members paid or otherwise, want from this organization in both short and long run. An Open Letter to the CM of Assam

At first, let me thank you for leading our home state Assam and making it glorious and prosperous. Also I thank you because in various occasions you have shown your eagerness and earnest desire to visit the US to meet the Assamese people living abroad so that they can participate in the development of Assam. In last few years' Assamese people have come to US in groups and established themselves in prominent positions. However, compared to the other states of India, the number of Assamese people coming to US is very small. At the same token, we have to give credit to people of other states because they have discovered US much before than we did. When they started their own big companies to compete with their US counterparts, we were soliciting employment in those companies. However, you will be happy to know that today many Assamese entrepreneurs established their own companies and doing an admirable job.

Sometimes I go to meetings organized by other Indian communities. Whether it is cultural or religious get together, whoever speaking as President or Chief Guest in those get-togethers the starting line of their speech invariably start with "We are a great Indian community starting from Kashmir to Kanya Kumari in the north south direction and Gujarat to Bengal in east west direction." Are we missing something in this statement? Are there not seven other states beyond Bengal? I think, it is mainly due to their ignorance about geographical boundaries of the Indian continent. At the same time we should blame ourselves for not raising our voice for this injustice imposed by other Indian communities. My appeal to you that it is time, we should work hard to put our name in the Indian Map once and for all. As Chief Minister of the State, you have to carry most the burden to fulfill this objective. We need to do our homework selectively and show that this work has the nation's attention. The following paragraphs describe a few things that we can do effectively to give a movement to achieve that goal.

What I feel, first and foremost, we need a strong presence of the Assamese Community in the US. There are various avenues in the US that we should exploit to achieve this goal. The key to survival in the US is to get a job. Currently, various news and media groups giving a very bleak picture about the US job market. However, if someone critically analyzes the job market, it is vivid that there are at least few areas in which jobs are plentiful. These areas are Information Technology, Hospital Nurse Assistance and Physical Therapy, Biotechnology, Bio-Engineering, etc.

Information Technology (IT) and Biotechnology has lots of future and growth. Many feel that currently, IT has reached its peak and do not see any further growth. However, many trade magazine and other news media are debating and think that it is still in its formative years. Nobody can predict the future but many agree that IT is here for the long run. Assamese people have a fair share of these job opportunities and many intelligent individuals established themselves in a very strong position. However, relative to other states of

India, Assam's share of this pie is very minimal. My feeling is that a state sponsored program in IT will not go waste.

The current statistics shows that about forty percent of the American work force will be retiring by 2010. There is a term widely used as Baby Boomers retiring in 2010. There is prediction that this event will create lots of job opportunities for the Hospital Nursing Assistant and Physical Therapist. The US Commence Department and Labor Department statistics shows that there will be one million Nurse Assistants and one million Physical Therapists will be required by 2010. The local graduates from US in this field will probably fill only about 40% of those jobs. To meet this demand US have to get people from out side the country.

The other Indian States and countries like the Philippines and Indonesia have already started gearing up to take a large share of these job opportunities. We have seen Nurses from southern states of India already working in various hospitals in US.

It is high time we should equip ourselves if we are interested to have a large share of these job opportunities. With a proper training program in place, this can be easily achieved. The kind of jobs I have illustrated may go against the grain of jobs what Assamese people are aware of. Because we are so use to jobs like doctors, engineers, computer scientist etc., but trends are changing and what is becoming important for many is how much we earn rather than what we do. National statistics about average salary by different professions put Nursing and Physical Therapist salary way above than many other professions.

The basic requirements to fulfill the criteria are to go through standard curriculum as it is taught in US. At the same time, the candidates need to have fluency in English and speak English in an American way. We have full confidence that Assamese men and women are brilliant enough to grasp these training programs very easily. We also have full confidence that, by discussion with your colleagues, you can establish training centers, so that graduates from those centers can directly compete for jobs here in US.

It is in the Assam's news media that you are eager to come to US and meet and discuss business deals with Assamese people here so that Assamese people has some investment in Assam. My appeal to you that besides meeting Assamese entrepreneurs please widen your horizon and try to meet groups of Indian communities and make them excited to set up industries and establish training facilities in Assam. Ideal time to visit and meet people is during Indian Independence day (15th August) or Indian Republic day



(26th January). These are the dates when you can take advantage of large gathering of Indian people.

Mousumi Saharia: *A musical career in brief ...*

Mousumi Saharia is a popular name for Assamese music lovers. Her sweet and melodious voice has captured the heart beat of many fans. She started her musical career at the age of 5 years at Mangaldoi, in northern Assam. Her first commercial release was an audio cassette in 1990 which got overwhelming response from her fans. In 1995 her next solo album *Tumi Mousumi* sold more than 100,000 copies. *Moi Mousumi*, *Morimi Mousumi*, *Jauban*, *Mon Nache Ulahot*, etc. are super hit albums released in the subsequent years.

From 1998 to 2001, she had 5 super hit albums released, namely *Rongmon*, *Nache Nache Lage Mon*, *Kokalore Gagoni*, *Hiyar Morom* and *Devi Mantra*, with co-singers like Udit Narayan, Kumar Sanu, Sadananda Gogoi and Zubeen Garg.

Two of her best albums are *Akashi Ganga*, eight nos. of popular songs of

Dr Bhupen Hazarika, followed by *Manuhe Manuhor Babe*. Both the albums were wide accepted by the people of all over. Even Dr Hazarika was thrilled to listen his songs sung by Mousumi and opined as "All the upcoming singers who have sung my songs, Mousumi is the best among them".

Not only in the field of music, but Mousumi has excelled in academics as well. She appeared 10th final examination from T.C. Girls High School, Guwahati and stood 1st with highest mark in Music (93%) in all-Assam basis. In 1998, she stood 3rd in all-Assam basis 12th examination from Cotton College, Guwahati. Mousumi graduated from Cotton College (under Gauhati University) in 2001 and secured 1st Class 1st position with Distinction in Education. In 2004, she completed her post graduation in Education from Gauhati University and secured 1st Class 2nd position.

Mousumi performed in London on the occasion of birth centenary celebration of Jyoti Prasad Agarwalla in 2003, organized by Assam Sahitya Sabha, UK Chapter. Besides, she has also performed in different parts of India. So far, Mousumi has sung in more than 80 albums.

She has also sung for several television shows, films, and video albums.

Scholastic Achievement Recognition Program (SHARP) is the forum of Assam Society of America (Asom Xangha) for awarding financial awards to the needy and meritorious school children of Assam. In this program, 20 students have been awarded each for an amount of Rs. 1000.00 pa currently below 12th grade only. The number can be increased based on pledge and donation. Outlined below are the eligibility requirements:

Eligibility for the awards will be based on purely academic merit and/or achievements in sports combined with financial need. The applicant for the academic awards will need to score over 70% in the last two annual examinations and the applicants for the sports awards should have received at least two honors in interschool tournaments or higher forums of games.

Eligible applicants with parental income of less than Rs. 3500/- per month will receive preference. Applicants need to submit copies of the last two annual marksheets and a financial statement from parents on their annual income. Alternately, the applicant can simply send one letter of application quoting the scores of the last two annual examinations and the annual income of their parents, if the headmaster of the school under his/her official seal authenticates the scores and the income.

Presently, only the students between the 5th and the 12th grades residing in Assam are eligible.

Headmasters of the High Schools in Assam are encouraged to recommend names of two students from their schools for these awards by sending a recommendation letter quoting the student's scores for the last two annual examinations and financial status of their parents. AFNA General Body Meeting – 2004 (Partial Minutes)

Meeting chaired by: Atul Sarma, Debabrata Sarma, Rathin Devchoudhury and Krishanu Kaushik

1. Financial Statement: Balance Sheet of the prior term 2002-2004 was presented by the president of the old committee, the summary of which is as follows:

- A. Amount Received: \$ 73,005.12
- B. Amount Disbursed: \$ 40,239.90
- C. Earmarked Funds: \$ 25,658.00

D. Net Balance (A-(B+C)): \$ 7,107.22

2. Sanjeevani: Krishanu Kaushik gave a presentation on Sanjeevani, a rehabilitation center for disabled children in Tezpur Assam, registered as an NGO.

Pledges for \$1,500 were received from the following individuals: Barada Sarma, Nripen Barua, Brajen Bordoloi, Lohit Duttabarua, Gautam Bothakur, Rajen Barua, Satyajit Dutta, Pallav Bordoloi, Atul Sarma, Jib Talukdar, Jayanta Sarma and Krishanu Kaushik.

3. C-NES Media Fellowship: Adaptation of a presentation created by Ranjan Das of Bay area was presented by Krishanu Kaushik. Pledges for about \$ 2000 have been received so far. A resolution was taken to contribute \$ 500 from AFNA's general fund

4. AID NE-Cell and Ship of Hope: Anand Sivaraman from AID Boston took the attendees through a multimedia presentation which showcased various activities of AID in India in general and the North East India in particular. He also gave a detailed presentation of the Ship of Hope project undertaken by Sanjaya Hazarika led Center for North East Studies. This project won a grant of \$ 20,000 from the World Bank. The total budget is for \$ 30,000. Need an additional \$ 10,000.

5. Aarohan: Dr. Sangeeta Saikia took the attendees on a visual journey from the conceptualization of Aarohan to its current state. Several younger members of the community were impressed by this presentation and came forward to

extend a helping hand. AFNA has committed to a long term relationship with this pet project of Dr. Bhabendranath Saikia.

A resolution was taken to contribute an additional \$ 500 from AFNA's general fund. If there is a surplus in the convention, it will be forwarded to the general fund of AFNA and the new executive committee may increase the contribution from the general fund towards this project.

6. Appointment of New Committee: Dr. Debabrata Sarma announced the names of the new nominees, got approval from the attendees present and formally announced the appointment of the new committee (for the term 2004 July - 2006 July) as follows:

After my experience in Israel I had the opportunity to work for friends from Israel, which gave me more exposure in Europe. I decided to carry my volunteering works for the needy and thus I joined CSV, a reputed NGO of England which works for people with various disabilities like cerebral palsy, epileptic, and developmental disabilities. I worked for this organization for one and half year, which really opened my mind towards this new area of work. I realized how much



affection these people need. I found a meaning of life to live with, I found myself in peace of mind which is hard to define.

After my project in England I went back to India and started helping friends from Israel for the development of new projects.

In the mean time, after many interviews I cleared a place in Camphill Soltane, PA, in USA (www.camphillsoltane.org). This is a non-profit organization that works for people with special needs. So here I am since last one year, contributing for the development people with special needs.

I have been doing all these without any formal education in this field. Since the day I realized my potential in this work, I have always wanted to study social work but never had an opportunity. This time my organization has sponsored me to study social work and so I am studying in USA now and also working for Camphill Soltane at the same time. Stewart J McCracken Award to Arpita Choudhury

Arthritis Foundation of Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter has helped millions of Pennsylvanians who suffer from different kinds of arthritis and autoimmune disease like lupus. The foundation also supports outstanding investigators who are making research breakthroughs. The Stewart J McCracken Award is presented annually to the individual who receives the highest-rated research project in the Philadelphia area. The recipient for this year's award is Dr Arpita Choudhury. Dr Choudhury became interested in autoimmune diseases when she pursued her Ph.D at the National Institute of Immunology, New Delhi, India. She is currently pursuing research at the University of Pennsylvania, School of Medicine. Her pioneering studies on "The loss of immune tolerance in the context of lupus" has been widely acclaimed.

Systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE) or "lupus" is a devastating autoimmune disease that can affect joints, skin, kidneys, heart, lungs, blood vessels, the nervous system and brain. It is characterized by production of autoantibodies against a wide-spectrum of self-antigens and deposition of

immune-complexes in different organs. The prevalence of lupus is estimated to range from 250,000 to more than 1 million people in the United States, typically women between the ages of 15 and 45. SLE disproportionately affects minorities. Lupus occurs three times more often in African-American women than Caucasian women and is also more common in women of Hispanic, Asian and Native-American descent. Lupus is the leading cause of death among women with autoimmune diseases who are in their childbearing years. People with lupus are at greater risk of heart attacks, strokes, osteoporosis and kidney failure than would be expected in those without lupus.
